DUAL DIAGNOSIS: MENTAL ILLNESS AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE. Dual diagnosis is a term used to describe a person who is diagnosed with a mental illness a substance use or abuse and disorder at the same time. More than half of persons who have a serious mental illness also have a substance use or abuse disorder. Dual diagnosis is sometime referred to as co-occurring disorders or comorbidity.

### DUAL DIAGNOSIS: MENTAL ILLNESS AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE

Dual diagnosis adds complexity to assessment, diagnosis, treatment and recovery, and can be associated with increased incidences of relapse. Research suggests that people with a dual diagnosis respond well to integrated programs that address both their mental illness and their substance misuse.

### Substance misuse and mental illness - dual diagnosis ...

When you have both a substance abuse problem and a mental health issue such as depression, bipolar disorder, or anxiety, it is called a co-occurring disorder or dual diagnosis. Dealing with substance abuse, alcoholism, or drug addiction is never easy, and it's even more difficult when you're also struggling with mental health problems.

### Dual Diagnosis: Substance Abuse and Mental Health ...

At the same time, around half of patients in drug and alcohol services have a mental health problem (most commonly depression or personality disorder<sup>1</sup>). In a major study<sup>2</sup>of people involved in substance misuse treatment, one in five people reported recent psychiatric treatment.

### Mental health and substance misuse

In spite of the high prevalence, high risks and poor outcomes associated with the co-morbidity of mental ill health and substance misuse (dual diagnosis), it is widely recognized that the skills required to effectively engage, screen, assess and treat such clients who present for treatment are largely limited.

### Mental Health and Substance Use (Dual Diagnosis) MSc ...

Substance use disorders — the repeated misuse of alcohol and/or drugs — often occur simultaneously in individuals with mental illness, usually to cope with overwhelming symptoms. The combination of these two illnesses has its own term: dual diagnosis, or co-occurring disorders. Either disorder (substance use or mental illness) can develop first.

### Depression and Addiction | Dual Diagnosis

Many people diagnosed with a substance use disorder (SUD) also suffer from a co-occurring mental health or behavioral disorder. This is known as a dual diagnosis. Individuals with a dual diagnosis require an integrated treatment plan that addresses both disorders as interconnected mental health issues. According to the National Survey on Drug Use and Health (NSDUH), 45 percent of people with addiction have a co-occurring mental health disorder.
